LOCALS PLAYED BAINBRIDGE TO A TIE

Nothing and Nothing Was Final Score in Football Contest Neither Side Being Able To Reach the Goal—Game One of Much Interest.

Neither side was able to score in yesterday afternoon's football contest between Bainbridge and Thomastville. The visitors got the ball within ten inches of goal on one occasion and were held for down. On another occasion, on a short punt, Bainbridge carried the ball over for what appeared to be a touchdown. The umpire and blown the whistle, however, before the ball was received for an offensive play and the score did not count.

Both teams put up a scrappy game, but one that developed into a line bucking contest almost entirely. The exceptions were notable in that they failed to snap the ball, both sides being far over the head of the back selected to receive it, and in one instance came very near losing the game. The locals also tried forward passes one after another, but failed to make any of them go. They intercepted two of the enemy's and Bainbridge got one of the Thomastville passes but neither side made much by them.

The Thomastville side received the kickoff and returned ten yards, an overthrow of the snap but thirty yards, and Thomastville kicked fifteen yards. Bainbridge attempted a forward pass after three line bucks and Thomastville recovered the ball. Thomastville gained five yards on two line plunges and then another overthrow of the ball gave Bainbridge the ball 12 yards from the goal post. Bainbridge made first down on three bucks and then with the loss yards of spot and four consecutive bucks, the first yard gained on the yard each and the last one falling by the inches of goal.

were for any considerable distance and the ball sea-sawed in midfield most of the time. Cooke broke through twice in the quarter and this looked like a possibility.

Thomastville kicked off in the third and Bainbridge could not make first down. Thomastville tried three forward passes in succession, all being incomplete. Bainbridge made first down one time and Thomastville twice, but neither side advanced materially, the ball being in midfield at the end of the quarter.

In the fourth quarter the play was snappy but without results. Nothing spectacular occurred, although the side lines were falling for somebody to break loose and score. Punts were resorted to by both sides and each made first down. Thomastville recovered on a humble one time but lost it again before two downs. Bainbridge failed to gain materially and as the game closed the ball was still near midfield and neither side at an advantage.

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 12.—"If you had been with us in France, you'd be glad to join the Red Cross now," is one of the slogans employed by the Paris Island Fourth Red Cross Roll Call workers and so effective did this prove that on the opening day of the roll call nearly 1,000 of the 2,312 Marines here stationed here banded to their membership. This announcement being made at Southern Division headquarters today. Advice received from practically every section of the division embraced in the Southern Division are of similar import and strongly indicate a hundred per cent increase in Red Cross membership in many sections.

In his last report to the Southern Division, Chief Director William B. Phillips, of Paris Island, after recounting the tremendous increase in membership, stated that the roll call was held from that time on.

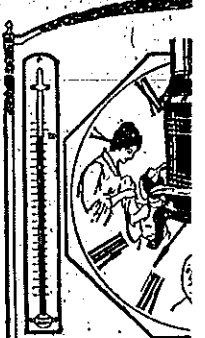
