Out of the first ten passes Thomasville tried ten fell safe. The Thomasville line jumped into the game and from the first whistle they could not be stopped. The work of the whole line was good, they charged low and hard and on numerous occasions they threw the Bainbridge backs for a loss. The ends were fast getting down on punts, while George Pfister, doing the punting for Thomasville, displayed a wonderfully educated toe. His punts were long and well placed. The Thomasville backs did not have much work to do as far as defense was concerned because Clyde Dunn did it to perfection by backing up the line. Dunn was without a doubt the individual star of the game and he never played harder and showed more fight in his life. His tackles were fierce and the man carrying the ball was simply set back when he started through the line.

Lambert, who was acting captain in place of Burch, played a great game, too. Here is a boy who is destined to make All Conference this year. He is a hefty player, hard to rattle and possesses a good knowledge of football. Willis, playing the other tackle, also performed well. Very few yards were made over him. Daniels and Petty, at the ends, were deadly tacklers all the way through, Daniels being good at separating the interference. Petty caught some passes for nice gains.
