BULLDOGS ROLLED UP 14 FIRST DOWNS TO SIX FOR PELHAM

Statistics of yesterday's football game between Thomasville's Bulldogs and the Pelham Hornets show that the Bulldogs rolled up a total of 14 first downs from sixteen plays for a total of 268 yards rushing the ball on 38 plays.

Pelham managed to score six first downs in the first half and five in the second half, and the remaining two first downs came on forward passes. They gained only six yards from scrimmage on thirteen plays. They completed three forward passes for a total of 23 yards.
