Straight Running Plays Get Scores; Defense Stronger

Coach E. O. Garner's Thomsville Bulldogs easily overpowered the Monticello, Fla., Tigers, 27-0, in the Bulldogs' first home game of the year in Veterans Memorial Stadium Friday night.

The Bulldogs, depending mostly on straight running plays between the tackles, scored twice in the first quarter, once in the second and third periods before turning the score of the game over to the reserves.

Showing greatly improved defensive play, the Thomsville first team held the Tigers in a game of only 20 yards and no first downs in the two and one half quarters that they were in the game.

Fullback Charlie Grant showed up as the offensive star of the game, twice breaking through for a touchdown, but it remained for James Owen, Grant's substitute, to lead the Bulldogs to their longest run of the night. He sped 20 yards through the entire Monticello team from the line of scrimmage before being forced out of bounds. His run went for naught when the reserves failed to push across a marker from there.

Grant scored another of the Thomsville touchdowns on a five yard punt and Wesley Pughum and Walter Burgess each crossed the goal line once on short runs. Lyle Cooper touched down in the second quarter on a 10 yard run from placement before making his third try.

Jimmy Harper attempted only six passes and completed four of them for 43 yards. Al Birkner connected once in two attempts to lead the Bulldogs' huddle. Forrester for a six yard gain.

St. Mary's, Sept. 18.—The Gaels of Little St. Mary's swung a fancy Sunday punch at Georgia Friday night and held the bulldozers to a 7-7 tie in an intercollegiate football upset.

The Gaels were outwitted and outplayed. They rallied behind John Henry Johnson, their big center, who snatched and surpassed the Bulldogs, and made 15 first downs to nine by the Georgians.

Pre-game dopsters had made Georgia a 20-point favorite and pointed in the Bulldogs' 23 pound weight advantage in the line as a basis for their prediction.
