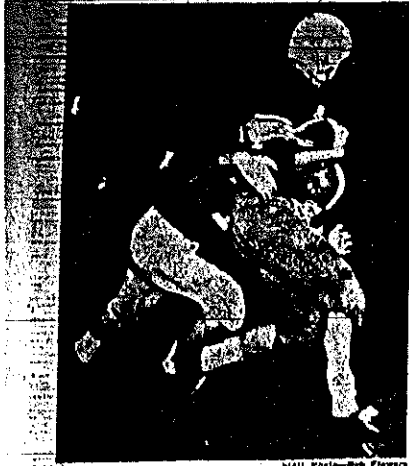

BROOKLYN, (AP)—Spurred by the running of Jackie Robinson, the clouting of Tony Campanella and the pitching of Johnny Podres, the Dodgers were back in high spirits today confident they have a real chance to overtake the New York Yankees and become the first Brooklyn club to win a World Series.

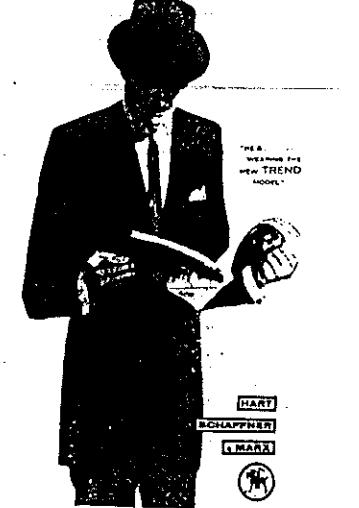
