

# Hulldogs Roll Past Americus, 33-0, For 2nd Win

## Thomasville Defense Stops Panthers Cold

Thomasville Hulldogs used a brickwall defense and a sham-bug ground attack to roll past the Americus High Panthers, 33-0, last night at Americus.

It was the second win of the Hulldogs since they were charged and their most envious triumph over Americus since the Hulldogs beat the Panthers by a lopsided score in 1942. It was the second loss in as many starts for the Panthers this year.

The victory was the 11th straight in regular season play for the Thomasville eleven. They started their streak on the first game of the 1944 season.

The Hulldogs had their offensive line pulled down in the first quarter and scored three times on a one-yard plunge, a seven yard sprint and a 15-yard pass. A 21-yard dash by Fletcher put them at 10 yards from scrimmage. Halfback Curtis Helbert, on one yard, after a 10-yard run, set it up with a 21 yard gallop. Quarterback Julian Hogg connected with end Joe Collins for a tally on a play which covered 40 yards in addition. Hogg romped 45 yards in only nine running efforts.

But it was the Hulldogs' front end, with the help of the fullback, Helbert, and Arrington backfield foursome, which stole the show.

The Thomasville eleven stayed Americus completely off its feet. The Hulldogs' first line of defense was mainly responsible for holding the Panthers to 31 yards rushing. They never allowed the AHB eleven to cross the middle of the field. Americus never got past its own 40 yard line. And only once did it manage to get even that far up the field.

With Joe Collins, the mate at end Larry May and Warren Haddenberry, tackle Larry Vio and Bill Lawson, guard Amos Hancock and Elton Collins leading the backfield, the Hulldogs stopped Americus for no gain.

They pinned them down behind the line of scrimmage 13 times. The Hulldogs' defense had only 30 plays from scrimmage.

IN COMPLETE CHARGE

Collins' close contest between the two teams was predicted, but the second time the Hulldogs got their hands on the ball they were able to get in 13 yards of score. There was no stopping the fired up Thomasville end after that. They were on complete charge from the start.

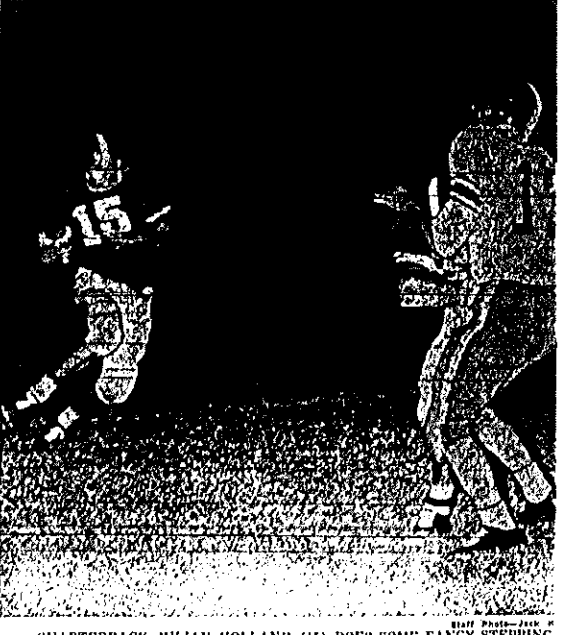
Arrington and Holland were the big gainers for the Hulldogs. They carried the record 21-100 yards rushing. Whitehead gained 34 yards on seven carries. Helbert went 28 yards on a like number of carries.

The Panthers did manage to get in the plus yardage column when they got in 13 yards in 35 yard yard air route with 11 completions in seven attempts. But the Hulldogs intercepted the ball on the 10 yard line and turned two of them into TD's.

## Orloles Player Feared Dead In Airplane Crash

BALTIMORE (AP)—A submerged subject struck by a fishing boat injured the search party for Tom Orloles, a player on the Baltimore Orioles, which apparently carried him to his death Thursday evening.

Recovery yesterday of a red Buick sedan, containing several unidentified persons, belonging to the single-engine plane, the 23-year-old Orloles, a player on the Baltimore Orioles, was found floating in the Chesapeake Bay.

He wasn't able to give his position, a distressing promise his league father who took up flying over the bay, but he was believed to have been on the water for some 20 hours of solo time and was flying a single engine plane which he bought three months ago.
