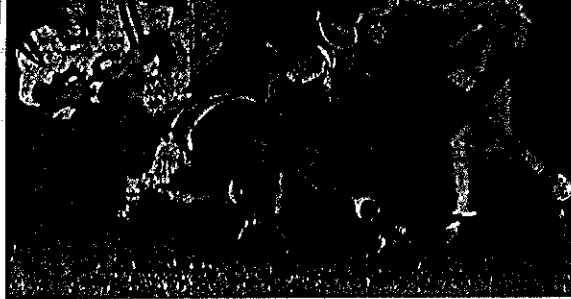
Washington High of Quantico scored in the final minutes of play to edge the Douglass High Lions of Thomsaville, 12-6 last night.

BAINBRIDGE—Thomsaville's Bulldogs used a crushing ground attack to march 72 yards early in the fourth quarter for a touchdown, which gave them a 12-7 come from behind victory over the previously unbeaten Bainbridge Bearcats here last night.

The Bulldogs had tallied in the second period on a 21-yard sprint by halfback Ralph Morrison before the game. The Bearcats recovered fumble and the Bulldogs' 10 and converted it into a touchdown. Fullback Fred Barber scored from 10 yards when quarterback Bill Tyson's placement was good. Bainbridge went out at the half with a 7-0 lead.

Halfback Ed Varner, fullback Fred Barber and Tyson were the Bearcats' attack leaders. Varner gained 44 yards on 11 carries, including one five-yard run which was good for 10 yards. Barber, the workhorse, picked up 14 yards in 10 plays against the stubborn Thomsaville line. Tyson got just 10 yards on seven tries, but he picked up nine of the 10 yards. Bainbridge needs 100 yards for its score.

The victory was the fourth in five starts for coach Joe Bunnell's Bulldogs and moved them into a tie with Ocala for the early lead in the league. The Bearcats' first setback in five out of six games was charged to an individual eliminated player, Steve Davis, charged to the substitution error. The team has never won the loop title after suffering a defeat in last year's game.

Thomsaville came out of the game with a decided statistical advantage. The Bulldogs led in first downs 11 to 4 and in yards rushing, 27 to 18. Bainbridge led in punts, 18 passes and interceptions, only two to 24 yards. The Bulldogs intercepted two of the Bearcats' passes.
