Bulldogs To Face Rebels In Playoff

The Thomasville Bulldogs and Crisp County High Rebels of Cordele will meet next Friday in a playoff for the Region 1-AA football championship.

Officials from the two schools were to meet at Tifton today to select a side for the contest. They can pick a side by mutual agreement. If there is no agreement, then a coin will be flipped. The team winning the toss then gets to pick the playing

side. Thomasville will represent the southern half of the region and Crisp County the northern section in the playoff game.

Both teams closed out their regular seasons with 9-1 records and perfect 4-0 subdivisions.

The Bulldogs clinched the "southern" crown with a 30-0 victory over Cairo last night. Crisp County nailed down the "northern" title with a 13-12 triumph over Americus.

This will mark the second time the Bulldogs and Rebels have met in the 1-AA playoffs. Thomasville defeated Crisp County 21-14 in the first match, and went on to win the South Georgia Class AA championship and share the state "AA" crown with Americus.

This will be shooting for the fifth straight 1-AA championship. The Bulldogs have worn the region crown since 1953.

Both teams closed out their regular seasons with 9-1 records and perfect 4-0 subdivisions.

The Bulldogs clinched the "southern" crown with a 30-0 victory over Cairo last night by handing the Hornets a double-seal.
