

# Caloro Rambles To 20-13 Win In Tallahassee

 The Caloro Ramblers took the opening kickoff and marched to the TD in the first three minutes of the game. They then staved in the lead 14-0 until the top Leon High of Tallahassee, 20-13, in the Florida State League game. Behind the prowess of left halfback R. B. Caloro, who was named MVP, the Ramblers were never in trouble as they used almost every offensive formation to pile up 27 rushing yards and 14 first downs. Caloro made 103 yards and the 170-pound speedster also piloted two passes from the line for 48 yards, one for the first touchdown.

Bobby Manning, his halfback partner, slipped off 102 yards in 12 carries for a 10.2 yard average. The Georgia visitors tallied 54 the Leon record game, but Leon quarterback Bob Williams was battered 11 yards in two punts and a dazzling aerial display.

Williams connected on nine of 17 passes for 111 yards and both the "Lion" touchdowns. End Hugh Woolen was his favorite target. Woolen grabbed three touchdowns for 27 yards and one TD. It was Caloro's first victory over the Lions. The two teams hadn't played since 1945, when he "record" stood, two wins for Leon and one for Caloro.

Caloro played a big part in the opening scoring march, peddling 11 yards on the first play from scrimmage, taking a yard pass from Jimmy Massey and battering 11 yards in two punts in play.

Manning went 10 yards to the end zone, and when two plays later only three yards, Manning passed to Caloro for the TD. Midway in the second quarter, Williams started another drive from the 40-yard line and handed off to Caloro, who ran 10 yards in seven plays.

Caloro's all game started to take the second quarter with a successful completion to the line 42. After three straight

# BULLDOG RALLY WINS, 12-7, OVER PACKERS

The Thomasville Bulldogs rallied themselves off the canvas last night and availed two magnificent homers to overcome a 7-0 lead and defeat the Moultrie Packers, 12-7, before 6,000 fans at Veterans Memorial Stadium.

It was Thomasville's third consecutive victory over the Packers and Moultrie's third loss in a row. The Bulldogs now have a 2-1 record. Their 10th victory was over Berrien County.

The Bulldogs, who had their best game back in Valdosta a week ago by lone run, turned off the same weapon successfully against the Packers. They scored on a 48-yard rally by quarterback Doug Vick early in the second period, and on a 48-yard combo started by Vick and completed by halfback Jerry Hand, who took a lateral from Vick around the 15-yard line, in the fourth period.

Moultrie broke the scoring tie after a rugged defensive stand-off between two line forward walls. On the last play of the second period, with two seconds showing on the clock, Moultrie quarterback Charles Figgins led a drive and screen pass to halfback Brad Bradberry and he scooted around left end, unopposed, to the end zone. End Wayne Tucker added the point.

Midway the fourth period, tackle Billy Wilder recovered a Moultrie fumble on the Thomasville 48 after the Packers had worked back from their own 15-yard line. Wilder's carrying most of the load, the Bulldogs elicited off yard after yard. Moultrie 44, Jerry Vick rushed out to his left on a pass-run option play and found running room to the Moultrie 15. He met a roadblock at this juncture. Vick's lateral to Hand was blocked.

For the entire first half, the Bulldogs pressed no further than their own 35-yard line. Most of the time they were in deeper water than that. But once they found running room, the tide of battle quickly changed.

Proof of this is shown in the statistics. The Bulldogs handled the ball from scrimmage on only 10 plays. Moultrie had 41 70 yards. The Bulldogs accounted for only 140 yards rushing, against 301 for Moultrie.

Outstanding in the Bulldog effort, it should be noted here, were the exceptional performances by backs George Herring and Doug Vick, end James Richards and guard Ted Singletary.

When the Packers moved to the Thomasville 20 early in the first period, it was Richards who led the first pass thrown in the ball game. When Moultrie started knocking on the golden gates again late in the second quarter, it was Ted Singletary who threaded a pass that temporarily staved the scoring threat. Richards also recovered two Moultrie fumbles.

While Richards and Singletary looked 10-foot tall on defense, Herring and Vick—both capable analysts from halfback Jerry Hand—were the workmen who brought home the score. Though Herring didn't score, he accounted for some precious real estate when the going was in an emergency state. And his puntline, as in the Valdosta game, was a joy to watch.

Vick, of course, was the offensive star and Thomasville's general hero. He batted for 101 yards in 12 carries while making necessary arrangements for Thomasville's two scores.

From start to finish, the game was a thing of beauty. It was a rugged, exciting defensive battle with a generous sprinkling of offensive sparks which set the house on fire.

Next week, the Bulldogs go back into Region IAAA action and the Thomasville Bulldogs will meet the Valdosta Bulldogs in another perennial tailgate.
